June Visioning Workshop a Resounding Success

Thanks to everyone who joined us for June's Visioning/
Brainstorming session at our last meeting. We had a great mix of both returning and new faces with almost 50 people in attendance.

This session is one of several steps leading us towards the



creation of a strategic plan including a mission statement ("why we exist"), a vision statement ("what we want to become"), and a set of strategies ("how do we get there").

As people arrived, everyone was asked to jot down their own ideas as to what CMAG's purpose is and what their vision of CMAG is in the next 3-5 years. We began with a brief introduction to the brainstorming work the Board had done a month earlier. The core themes running through a lot of the discussion revolved around three key areas:

Education, Advocacy, and Community. We introduced a big picture idea for the future – eventually developing a space of our own for shared studio, galleries and shows, and meetings. As a group, people shared some of their thoughts, expanding on the three themes.

Business Development for Artists & Makers

The Society of North American Goldsmiths (SNAG) recently launched their "Road 2 Success" program to help artists and

makers in marketing and selling their work. For the quality of the content it's a great value, whether you participate in a single workshop or the monthly subscription.

There are four different avenues of education: CraftLabs, live Q&As with experts, resources and an 8-

week "Forging a Foundation" business plan development program.

Participants can opt in to single programs or subscribe monthly to get access to all upcoming and previous programs, (except the 8-week foundation). Individual live Q&As are only \$20 for non-SNAG members and \$10 for members. If you're not able to make the date, you can still get access to the recording. Recent topics have included branding, developing an artist statement and a bio, as well as pricing your work.

With the monthly subscription (\$19 for SNAG members, \$39 for nonmembers), you become part of a private Facebook page where participants can interact. Given that SNAG has already done a number of the Q&As, you could join for only a month and still have access to a lot of great information.

concepts, each facilitated by members of the board. The groups were tasked with brainstorming high level who/ what/where/when/how for expanding our educational programs, promoting our members, developing additional gallery shows, and building our community events (both internally and as outreach).

The teams worked on identifying manageable goals and activities, creating lists of initial steps needed to take action, clarify the types of resources and people needed to achieve them, and put realistic timeframes to them.

Everyone in attendance was engaged and really throwing out great ideas which we captured as notes – conversations continued even

through our breaks as the thoughts kept coming, and we got a great deal of positive feedback about the energy and potential for the next evolution of CMAG as a group.

We wrapped the session by having a representative of each group share the highlights of their discussion, and asked people to return to the introductory worksheets to tell us what, if anything, had changed in their vision of CMAG's future and which ideas they are interested in working on.

Since the session, Kathleen Baker and Rachel Morris, who have been co-facilitating this process, are analyzing and organizing the materials the Board and membership have provided, and trying to reach out to those of you who couldn't make the session but have thoughts for us.

We'll be meeting again with the Board to go over some ideas for developing a draft of a strategic plan including the mission statement based on what people expressed as being the heart of what we do, a vision statement and a timeline for both the short term and longer term strategic goals.


Can't Live Without It! Our Favorite Tools of the Trade

This month, our two Favorite Tool Tips comes from Pat McCormick. If you've got a favorite tool or tool-related tip, please send it to news@cmaguild.org with photos, where possible.

I usually use hole punching pliers to make holes but noticed they would leave marks in silver because the steel is so much harder than silver. So I polished smooth the anvil side of the pliers and put a copper bumper on the other side. Theseare 1.25 mm pliers from Euro tool.

When I make sanding sticks with spray adhesive I wrap one side of the stick with sandpaper and leave the other edge blank. This allow one to get into corners or to protect that edge when sanding.

Does anybody know how to
alloy blue gold? I've seen it
once and have a commission I'd
like to use it in but can't find a
source that sells it or how to
make it. I have a commission
request for a fireworks texture
and they are wanting different
gold colors. Also, how well does
it fuse?

Recipes: A commonly noted recipe for blue gold is 75 Au, 25 Fe (Iron), but this combo is reported to be very brittle and non-malleable.

Another recipe is 46% gold (about 12 karat) and 54% indium (Indium has the chemical element of atomic number 49, a soft silvery-white metal occurring naturally in association with zinc and some other metals). It appears some people use the indium version as a plating material, but it's reported to wear off rings quite easily.

Question from Marie-Helene

R: I know how to make a rubber mold with the vulcanizer, but I do not know how to neatly cut it open to have those beautiful reference corners (also called "Registration" marks). Also I have not been able to find that tool that looks like a tortured jaw opening, used to spread the two parts of the mold. Does anyone have any tricks and/or could they do a demo at a meeting? I would also like to learn more about the alternatives to rubber molds, such as silicone, how it works and pros and cons.
